Today there will be 222 reports of child abuse in Illinois.

Last year, nearly 34,561 children in Illinois were victims of abuse or neglect.

Founded in 1975, Shelter, Inc. has become a leader in Chicagoland for providing emotional and physical care, programs and services that children need to build safer, healthier and brighter futures. We are the only agency in the state to provide comprehensive and community-based services for children and families at risk and in need.

Our mission is to end the cycle of child abuse by providing a comprehensive network of support, ensuring safe, healthy and nurturing environments to children, their families and our community. We are available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

Our goal is to create a world where all children grow up in safe and nurturing environments.

Emergency Group Homes

Providing temporary relief can improve family stability and prevent child abuse and neglect.

Shelter's Boys' Group Home and Jennings Group Home for Girls provide emergency housing for youth ages 11 - 17 who are experiencing crisis due to abuse or neglect, or are in need of emergency shelter due to family circumstances such as homelessness, illness or domestic violence.

Our homes are staffed 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Our staff provides trauma-informed care, and specialized support for the most marginalized populations such as children in the LGBTQ community and children who have been victims of commercial sexual exploitation.

In FY2020, 112 children in our emergency homes were given the physical and mental help they needed to heal from their trauma, with 2,086 days of care.








Transitional Living

Aging out of foster care leaves our youth in a situation in which they are vulnerable to homelessness

Shelter's Transitional Living Program (TLP) supports young men ages 17 - 21 who are homeless and aging out of the child welfare system. The goal of the two-year program is to provide support in a safe, appropriate, and stable home-like environment as they learn to transition to sustainable, healthy and independent living.

Support services target continuing education, stable employment, permanent connections, and social and emotional well-being. Life skills training includes essential skills from cooking and nutrition to budgeting, work ethics, and building self-esteem. In most cases, this is the last opportunity for these young men to learn healthy choices, resist gangs, crime and drugs while living off the streets, and to build productive lives with promising futures.

In FY2020, eight young men who were transitioning out of the child welfare system participated in our TLP. Two graduated from the two-year program with bright futures ahead.

Through a grant from the Illinois Department of Human Services and in partnership with the Kenneth Young Center, Shelter launched the Youth Experiencing Homelessness (YEH) program for young adults ages 14-24 without permanent housing.

For some youth, instability in their homes forces them out onto the streets before they are adults.

Common family experiences include child abuse and/or neglect, domestic violence, parental substance use, and family conflict related to a youth's sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression.

Services provided by Shelter are free, confidential, and voluntary, and include:

- Assistance with housing
- Pregnancy and parenting support
- Counseling
- · Life-skills training
- Other help needed to secure permanent housing

In FY2020, Shelter doubled the number of youth served through this program and helped them secure gainful employment.



Shelter, Inc.'s Foster Care programs are for children from birth through 21. Our programs include home-of-relative and traditional foster care. Families, with the assistance of foster care caseworkers, work to resolve the problems that brought the children or adolescents into placement so that they can be reunited as quickly as possible.

Foster parents may be single or have any marital status, working, in school, stay at home, or retired, have other children or live alone, be of any faith, sexual orientation, gender identification, or race.

In FY2020, 63 foster families were created, some temporarily, some permanently. Children who were unsafe in their homes were brought together with families to love them in stable and healthy environments where they can not only grow but also flourish.



- 21,919 days of care



COVID-19 RESPONSE

In March, Shelter employees began working remotely in response to guidelines set by the CDC and the State of Illinois Public Health Department. Shelter's program staff maintained connection with clients through virtual visits. A crisis fund was created to help Shelter families deal with job loss, food insecurity, and economic hardship created by the Pandemic. Thanks to community support and Shelter's dedicated essential workers and staff, each of our programs has remained open during the pandemic.


